Lesson:

Key Vocabulary: **Alliteration**

Say this word out loud. Count how many syllables there are. Are there any special friends in the spelling of it?

Alliteration means when words that are next to or near each other start with the same sound.

Examples you might recognise are:

'Shaun the sheep', 'SpongeBob square pants', 'Horrid Henry' 'Little red riding hood'.

This might be just the same starting letter or the same starting sound. It may be two words or even a whole sentence containing alliteration. We see this technique a lot in poetry.

Can you spot the alliteration in our poem?

This is the city:

buildings, buses, trains and cars

concrete, metal, bricks and glass

houses, lights and cinemas

shops and offices and bars

this is where the people are.

This is the city.

Independent task:

I would like you to create at least 3 different alliteration phrases.

This could be a list of nouns

Example:

**Train, trams, tractors and tunnels.**

(Remember to include a comma to separate each item in the list and use and before the last item).

Or to challenge you further create a list containing a noun, adjective, verb and even an adverb!

Example:

**The white, whistling windmill whirled around wildly in the wind.**
