<p>Write a diary entry for a 'day in the life' of a stone age human. Use ideas from the Stone Age boy, books or the internet.</p>	<p>Make a recipe using foraged ingredients (i.e. blackberries or apples). Remember to weigh your ingredients carefully and write your recipe into your book, include pictures/photos.</p>	<p>Investigate different caves around the world. Describe your favourite, include a map, why it is your favourite and pictures.</p>	<p>Research animals that would have existed in Stone Age times. Create an illustration of your favourite. Use any media you wish, maybe you could make your own paint and brushes?</p>	<p>Fine motor skills: find out what items the Stone Age people created by weaving. Make a weaving using paper, wool or other imaginative materials.</p>	<p>A lot of the animals that you have learnt about in prehistoric times are now extinct. Choose an endangered animal and write a prayer or a poem about how humans could save its species.</p>
<p>Write a list of nouns that would be around in the stone age and decide which article – a or an – should go in front. i.e. an arrowhead</p>	<p>The Stone Age people used tally marks to count. Solve a problem by counting tallies and creating a pictogram or use nrich website: Stone Age Counting</p>	<p>Describe the three parts of the Stone Age on a time line.</p>	<p>Make something a stone age person may have worn. Clothing, jewellery, headdress or all of these things!</p>	<p>Create a mirror dance (one that your partner copies facing you) using movements of a Stone Age hunter.</p>	<p>Design a poster showing the dangers of eating or drinking things that are not meant to be eaten or drunk when foraging in the hedgerows.</p>
