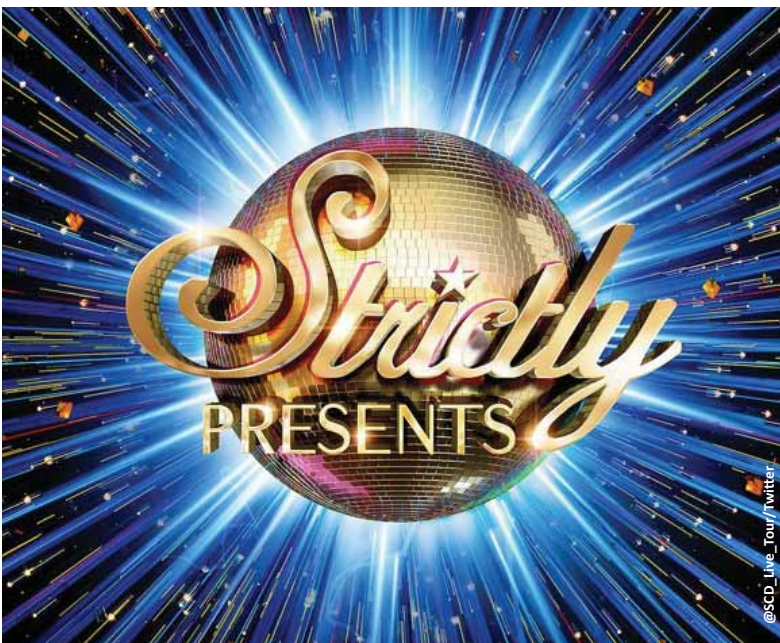

As well as live coverage of the events, each episode will feature the celebrities' preparation and their gruelling training programme leading up to the competition.



Velociraptors are getting their own rollercoaster! The Jurassic World VelociCoaster Ride will open at Universal Studio's Islands of Adventure this summer and will take riders on a high-speed chase alongside a raptor pack. The ride is not for the faint-hearted, as it catapults guests at up to 70mph and more than 45m (148ft) into the air.



Xmarks the spot and that spot is Plymouth's Barbican where, every year, it hosts two days of swashbuckling fun at the Plymouth Pirate Weekend. The event usually features a pirate trail, sword school, mermaids, bands and children's entertainment to keep all you landlubbers entertained.

Many campaigners say there hasn't been enough action in the years since the Paris Agreement, so will want to see bigger commitments.

W is for the **World Health Organization (WHO)**. The United Nations agency is responsible for global public health and will be important in helping to make sure COVID-19 vaccinations reach as many people as possible in 2021. COVAX, the campaign to make sure vaccines are accessible worldwide, recently said that it has nearly two billion doses being prepared, enough to vaccinate a quarter of all people on Earth. The plan is to get vaccines in the hands of the 190 participating world economies in the first half of 2021. Fingers crossed!



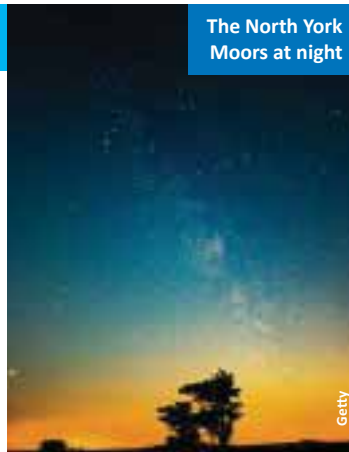
You can make a difference to the planet in 2021 by taking part in the Great British Beach Clean. The information that volunteers have collected at beach cleans over the years has helped make some of the most significant impacts on beach litter ever, from the plastic bag charge to microplastics being banned in personal care products. So far, the cleans have picked up 319 tonnes of litter. This year's events run from 18 to 20 September.

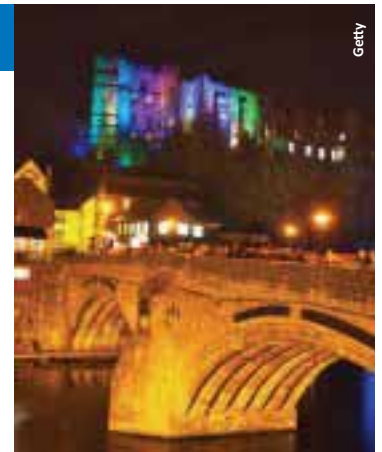

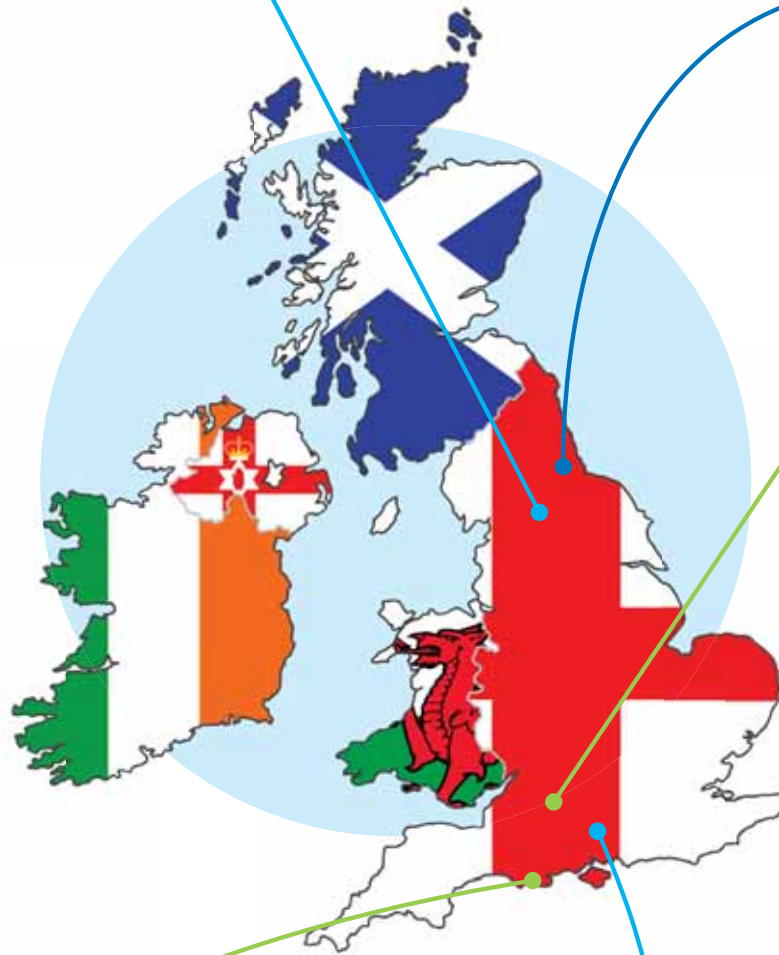

The health of our oceans continues to be a major problem in 2021. Rivers are the main source of ocean plastic pollution and 80% of river plastic comes from 1,000 rivers around the world. One hope to beat pollution in these rivers is the Interceptor. These solar-powered vessels have a conveyor belt that catches plastic as water passes through it.

Hopefully, scenes like this will be less common in 2021.

● Insect invasion

Every year, a small number of *Magicicada cassinii*, better known as cicadas, emerge from the ground in the eastern United States. But, every 17 years, a huge swarm of the insects, referred to as Brood X, appear. 2021 is one of those years, so billions of the creatures are set to take flight across large parts of the US. Luckily, they're mostly harmless, but it's still not great if you live in the middle of a swarm and have a bug phobia!

BARBADOS



● Going public

Barbados plans to remove Britain's Queen as head of state in 2021 and become a republic. This means that Barbados will have an elected president in power, instead of a king or queen. Governor-General Dame Sandra Mason called the move "the ultimate statement of confidence in who we are and what we are capable of". The country gained independence from Britain in 1966.

SWEDEN AND WORLDWIDE



● Greta grows up

This week, Greta Thunberg turns 18 – on 3 January, to be exact. Thinking of everything she has helped to achieve as a child, it's exciting to think of what she will do as an adult. In 2021, a series of concerts called Climate Live will take place in various locations around the world with her involvement – turn to p2 for details and dates. Also, Greta could be up for an Oscar! The documentary film *I Am Greta*, released last year, is one of three films that Sweden is considering to enter as their country's Best International Feature Film at the legendary awards show.



CHINA



● New theme park

Universal Studios is planning to open a new theme park in China, the Universal Beijing Resort. It could be open by May and will include loads of cool-sounding areas like Minion Land, Jurassic World and The Wizarding World of Harry Potter.



RWANDA



● Name the gorillas

It was believed once that mountain gorillas would be extinct by the year 2000 but, thanks to the efforts of conservationists, the species is still around. In September 2021, the Volcanoes National Park in Rwanda will continue its annual tradition of Kwita Izina, meaning "to give a name" in Rwanda's national language, Kinyarwanda. The week-long event sees all the baby mountain gorillas named, and raises awareness and funds for the ongoing protection of the endangered animals – less than 1,000 are left in the wild.

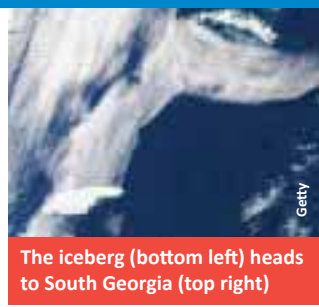


SOUTH GEORGIA ISLAND



● Iceberg alert

One of the world's largest icebergs, A68a, is on a collision course with South Georgia island and could cause problems for wildlife there. The island, in the southern Atlantic Ocean, is populated with penguins and seals. They could have trouble hunting for food around the island's waters if the iceberg gets too close. The big berg is 3,900km², or more than ten times the size of the Isle of Wight!

FRANCE



● Time for a sing-song

France will host European singing contest Junior Eurovision in 2021. The date and host city haven't been announced yet. Meanwhile, the Netherlands will host the main Eurovision Song Contest in May. The event will take place in Rotterdam's Ahoy Arena, which became an emergency hospital for COVID-19 patients in 2020.

A REAL SHOT IN THE ARM



The Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine

A HUNDRED years ago in 1921, the first BCG vaccine was given to a baby.

Designed to protect against TB (tuberculosis), 100 million children worldwide are now immunised with the vaccine every year.

It's hoped that we can protect people against catching COVID-19, just like we can stop the spread of TB. The first COVID-19 vaccine approved for use in the UK in December 2020 was created by Pfizer and BioNTech. Other vaccines are being developed and manufacturers are co-operating in combined

trials. British company AstraZeneca is working with Russia's Gamaleya Institute to test if their products work better if given together.

If more people can't catch a disease, it's less likely that disease will be able to spread. This is called herd immunity or herd protection. Measles and polio are two diseases that are now rare thanks to herd immunity. For this level of protection, between half and 90% of a population need to be immune. Thanks to vaccination, US infectious disease expert Dr Anthony Fauci and many health experts worldwide are predicting that herd immunity against COVID-19 could be achieved in their countries in 2021, as long as enough people can be vaccinated.

DEEP IMPACT

BUILDING a spacecraft and launching it is not cheap.

The DART mission, due to launch in July, is expected to cost around £230 million to build and safely send into space. And its ultimate aim? To crash into an asteroid!

It's estimated that there are about 25,000 near-Earth asteroids more than 500ft wide (152m). If one hit the Earth, it would have disastrous results. It's believed that the extinction of the dinosaurs 65 million years ago may have been caused by an asteroid hitting the planet. DART, or the Double Asteroid Redirection Test, is designed to investigate whether an asteroid could be deflected away from Earth.

The DART probe is about the size of a small car. It will contain a camera, as well as a sun sensor and star tracker for navigation. DART's planned destination is the asteroid Didymos, which it should reach in September 2022. There, it will collide with the asteroid's small moon, Didymos B (also known as Didymoon), which is around 520 feet (160 metres) in diameter. It's hoped that the impact will alter Didymoon's course, demonstrating how our planet could be defended in the future.

SUPERIOR SPACE SNAPS

A NEW telescope will be launched into space in October to explore distant worlds and stars and help uncover the origins of our universe.

The James Webb Space Telescope (also known as the JWST) will be a successor to the famed Hubble Space Telescope, launched in 1990. It is named after James E Webb, who oversaw NASA in the 1960s during their Mercury and Gemini launches.

The JWST will be six times larger than the Hubble, with a main mirror 21ft (6.5m) wide. It also requires a huge sunshield, to keep some of its instruments a few degrees above absolute zero, which is -273°C, the lowest possible temperature. The sunshield will be as large as a tennis court!

The JWST will orbit the sun, about 932,000 miles (1.5 million kilometres) from Earth. The telescope mainly uses infrared because interstellar dust blocks visible light, but not infrared. The Hubble has transmitted some breathtaking images from space and it's hoped that the JWST can show us many more older stars. It should be able to detect light from the first generation of galaxies that were formed in the early universe.

A SMASHING TIME...

AFTER being switched off more than two years ago to be upgraded, the Large Hadron Collider (or LHC) in Switzerland is ready to be restarted in May.

The LHC is located underground, beneath the French and Swiss borders at the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN), where the World Wide Web was first developed. 'Large' doesn't do justice to this incredible machine – it's an impressive 17-mile-long (27km) circular tunnel! The LHC is the world's most powerful particle accelerator. It makes particles known as hadrons travel at high speed, and it's called a collider because the machine makes these particles smash into each other. It can create one billion collisions every second!

The LHC was built to find out more about particles. In 2013, it even discovered a new one, the Higgs boson. It will also investigate dark matter, which is thought to make up 27% of the universe. After it's switched on again, the LHC will run until the end of 2024. Then it will be upgraded to the High-Luminosity LHC, which will be started up in 2027 and should produce ten times the amount of data as the LHC!

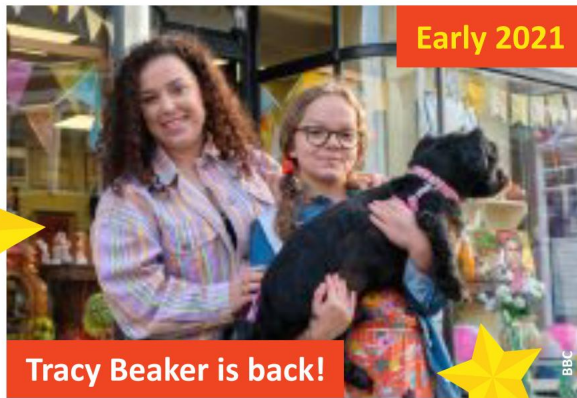

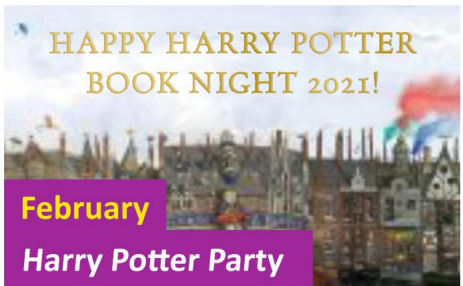

HAVE A

MAKE 2021 a wild year by learning about some of the amazing wildlife in Africa that is part of conservation projects supported by WWF – you can even learn the traditional names for some of the species!

JANUARY

In January, African wild dogs tend to avoid areas in the southern Serengeti because they are rich in the migrating prey that attract lions, which are a threat to wild dog cubs. Every African wild dog has colours and patterns that are one of a kind, and these can be used to identify each individual animal – just like fingerprints in humans. African wild dogs hunt in packs and are fast runners – they can get up to 60km/h when chasing their prey. The African wild dogs' habitat is becoming smaller and broken up, so WWF is working with local people to help create joined-up spaces so wild dogs can roam.

FEBRUARY

Valentine's Day would be a big hit with elephants. After being separated, even for only a few hours, African savannah elephants 'hug' each other by weaving together their trunks and tusks. They love to touch, to comfort and cheer each other up. The African elephant is the world's largest land mammal and males can measure up to three metres high and weigh up to six tonnes. They need 150kg of food per day and spend around 12-18 hours eating – that's up to 75% of their day. WWF is protecting elephants by joining forces with local communities to help stop poaching.

MARCH

Giraffes are the world's tallest land mammal – the males can reach about 5m tall. Even the babies are born measuring 1.8m, which is taller than the average human! Their neck is the longest of any animal, but it still has only seven neck bones, just like other mammals. These long necks mean they can eat the leaves right at the top of trees, so they don't have to compete with other, shorter, leaf-eaters. In March, after the start of the rainy season in the Serengeti, leaves are plentiful, so giraffes can enjoy the full benefit of being so tall. Giraffes are very sociable and roam together in groups called towers.

JULY

The hyena, Africa's most common big carnivore, has lots of prey in the Maasai Mara in July. There are three species of hyena – brown, striped

and spotted, with spotted being the largest. Hyenas live in large groups called clans, which are headed by a female and can include up to 90 animals. Although hyenas are famed as scavengers, they also hunt, sometimes including people's cattle, sheep and goats, which can lead to them being killed with poison in retaliation. WWF is supporting Maasai people with ways to protect their livestock and help stop the killings.

AUGUST

It's estimated that more than 40% of Africa's lions are found in Tanzania. Lionesses mostly hunt and take care of cubs, while adult male lions protect their pride from other lions and hyenas. August is a bonus month for the Maasai Mara's lions, as plenty of prey arrives with the wildebeest migration. A pride of lions is mostly made up of females and cubs. Groups of male lions, who are usually brothers, are called a 'coalition'. Although known for their roar, for a friendly greeting lions make

a puffing noise that sounds like sneezing. WWF supports work that monitors and protects lions in Kenya's Maasai Mara.

SEPTEMBER

September sees World Rhino Day. There are only around 5,600 black rhinos left in the wild, with about 680 black rhinos in Kenya. Black rhinos

(which are a grey colour, despite their name) are critically endangered. The name rhinoceros comes from two Greek words: 'rhino', meaning nose, and 'ceros', meaning horn. The black rhino has two horns, of which the front is larger and can grow to 1.3m. They weigh up to 1.3 tonnes but, despite this, can run at speeds of up to 55km/h in short spurts. WWF has worked in African rhino conservation since the organisation started in 1961.

WILDLIFE YEAR!

APRIL

During April's heavy rains, cheetahs and other species have wildlife parks to themselves. Cheetahs are the fastest land mammals, reaching up to 103km/h, although they can only keep that up for a few hundred metres. Cheetahs' paw pads have ridges, like the treads on car tyres, which act like running spikes to give them a better grip during a chase. There are only around 6,600 cheetahs left in the wild and they suffer from loss of habitat, as they need big areas of land to survive. WWF is working with communities to keep vital movement routes open for cheetahs and other wildlife.

MAY

Hippos need to stay in water during the day, as their skin must stay moist or it will crack. Their skin produces a red liquid, believed to act a bit like a sunscreen. Rather than eat the plants in the river, hippos come out of the water after sunset to spend the night grazing on short grass. May is a favourite time for the species, as the rainy season means more grass for them to munch. They're sociable creatures and live together in herds. WWF is helping hippos by tackling the loss of their habitats – one of the biggest threats they face.

JUNE

June is the beginning of the annual wildebeest migration cycle, travelling from the southern Serengeti in Tanzania to the Maasai Mara in Kenya and back again. Over a million wildebeest travel a total of 800km or more during the cycle, as they follow the rains in search of lush grass. This amazing sight is under threat, as more and more areas of land are fenced off for farming. WWF is working with governments and communities to keep areas open so this life-saving journey can continue.

OCTOBER

Leopards are one of the major predators of the Serengeti in Tanzania. They prey on the wildebeest and other herbivores. However, in dry months like October, prey is hard to find, and leopards are at risk themselves from lions and spotted hyenas stealing their food. Leopards tend to rely on cover to hunt and in areas where there are competitors like lions for food, leopards will often drag prey into trees to keep it safe. The spots on leopards' coats are known as rosettes and are unique. WWF is helping leopards by tackling the destruction of their habitat.

NOVEMBER

Burchell's zebras, or plains zebras, make up most of those that live in East Africa's savannahs. They travel in groups, sometimes known as a dazzle, but split up during the day to munch on grass before meeting up later to find water. Zebras live in permanent, small family groups, often mixing herds with antelope for extra protection against predators. There are around 250,000 zebras living in the Serengeti in Tanzania and 200,000 of these join the wildebeest in the world's biggest mammal migration, beginning their journey home in November. Although they may seem identical, no two zebras are exactly alike, as each zebra's stripes are different.

DECEMBER

Temminck's pangolin is the only type of pangolin found in East Africa. It is the second largest of the African species and weighs an average of 7-12kg – about the same as a standard dachshund. Pangolins are solitary, mostly nocturnal and easily recognised by their full body armour of scales. If attacked, they roll into a ball and use the sharp scales of their tails to lash out. Temminck's pangolins mostly eat ants and termites, but they are fussy about which types they choose. Dry months like December suit them better, as there is less chance of their burrows being flooded.

● **The Masked Singer is back, filmed with COVID rules in place. How was that, Joel? You were a big hugger in the last series!**

Joel: Yes, even though they were in these huge costumes, the people within the costumes were probably the people most protected from COVID of all time, but I still had to be two metres away. So I couldn't touch any of their costumes this year, which was a real shame! Apart from that, honestly, you wouldn't know that the show was done within COVID restrictions. The show looks so good that it looks even bigger and better than last year.

Jonathan: That was the one silver lining for me – that Joel couldn't hug me any more!

Joel: I know there is a lot of the country and the world waiting for this COVID to pass by, but for me especially, I really can't wait for it to end just so that I can hug Jonathan again!

● **How did you all find being on the panel with the new safety measures in place?**

Jonathan: It was interesting. The new panels initially threw me off. They are behind us to stop us breaking any guidance, but they kind of didn't matter too much because we could see each other, we could still hear each other and we were still close. So much of the show is us looking towards the stage that I think we were quite well placed to carry on. Obviously Joel had to stand a bit further away, but he never gets that close to the costumes anyway. We were lucky to be a show that could still function under COVID restrictions. Interestingly, we were recording with a small audience that were in groups of six so, of course, many of them were family groups with younger children. It was quite nice to be doing it and seeing eight, nine and ten-year-olds in the audience, because it is a family show.

Davina: You all had to watch your potty-mouths!

● **Mo, what was it like entering this strange new world?**

Mo: Oh my gosh, for me it was crazy because watching it on TV is so different to being there and being a detective. Everyone is so welcoming to the show and, early on, you realise that I'm not here to be a judge, I'm here to be a detective, which relieved the pressure a little bit. The last thing I want to do is be on a show and tell people they aren't good enough. If you're a detective, your job is just to guess. Everyone was super-welcoming and it felt like I was starting a show that I had already been a part of. It was a lot of fun and I really enjoyed it.



THE most bonkers singing show on TV is back with a whole new batch of mystery celebs in fantastic costumes. We caught up with host Joel Dommett and panellists Davina McCall, Jonathan Ross and Mo Gilligan at the virtual launch for the new series of *The Masked Singer*.

Davina: It was great watching him. He was like a puppy, he was so excited. Then, every now and then, he'd look over and he'd go: "It's really weird, this show!"

Joel: The number of times at the end of a performance, he'd go: "This show is mad, you know!" That was basically what he said at the end of every performance.

● **It seems like the audience and the panel were even more up for the fun this year!**

Davina: I was just so grateful to be with people. When I saw the dancers come out on stage I got a bit teary first of all. It was like, oh my goodness, there are dancers! This is actual entertainment! I felt so privileged to be able to come to work, to be with other people and sit next to people I love. For me, it was next-level emotional and exciting!

Joel: I think it reminded us, and made us appreciate even more, what we do. I tend to be so wrapped up in a project when I work that I stress so much and I don't tend to enjoy it. This is the first time where I took a step back a bit and really enjoyed the project and the fact that we can make this amazing show!

● **What was it like backstage this time? Were you all in your own little spaces?**

Jonathan: Yes and no. There were only a certain number of people allowed in any dressing room or space at a time. We did pop in and see each other, but we always had masks on. My dressing room was the coolest. I brought in posters and a record player and a box of vinyl so I could chill out.

Davina: It was amazing. I'm upping my game next time.



● **How did you all do with guessing the singers this year?**

Joel: Jonathan comes out with some mad names!

Davina: What I loved about this series was that all of us were wrong quite a lot! None of us got it.

Jonathan: The clues were really tricky this year.

Mo: It's so hard because the clue package to the performance doesn't always match up. So you look at the clues and think it is that person. Then they perform and it goes out the window.

Jonathan: Some people you think must be world-class singers, but some people you wouldn't think of as a singer. In fact, you might never have heard them sing before, but yet everyone on the show sounds like a professional singer. I think some even bigger surprises are in store this series. A lot of people guessed a lot of the celebrities last year, or said they did. I would be amazed if they did this year. No-one is going to get a full house and guess everyone!

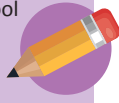
IN 2020, WE RECEIVED HUNDREDS OF YOUR REPORTS...

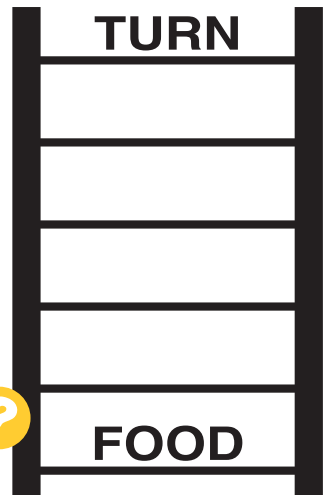

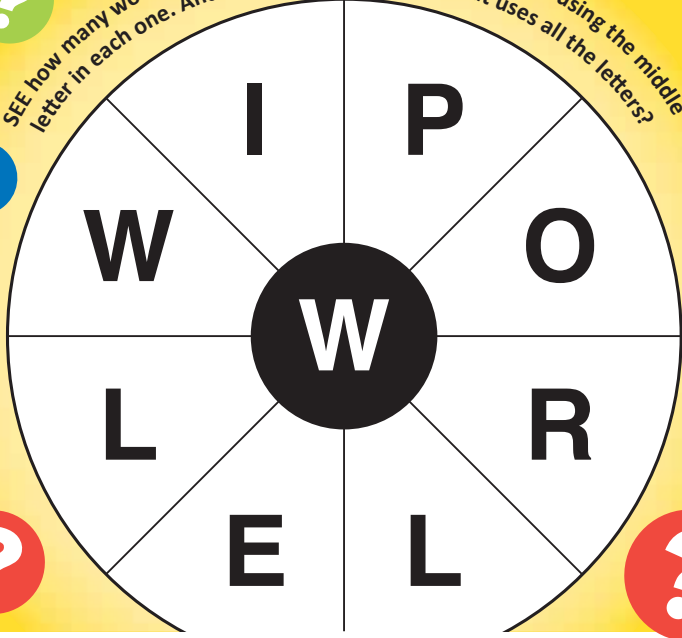

IT'S ALL KICKING OFF IN 2021

RUGBY UNION

A busy year in rugby union kicks off with the Six Nations (**6 February – 20 March**) – a fiercely competitive tournament that takes place every year between England, Wales, Scotland, Ireland, France and Italy. Last year's championships were postponed due to the pandemic, with only a handful of games left to play. However, play resumed in October, with England winning the men's and women's titles.

This summer (**3 July – 7 August**) also sees the British and Irish Lions – a team made up of players from England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland – go on tour again, as they do every four years. This time, they're heading to South Africa and will play the current world champions across three test matches. England's Owen Farrell and Maro Itoje, as well as Wales' Alun Wyn Jones, are all contenders for the captain's armband.

There could be more success for the England women's team, as they travel to New Zealand for the Rugby World Cup (**18 September – 16 October**). The Red Roses face France, South Africa and Fiji in Pool C, while Wales have been handed a nightmare draw in Pool A, taking on Australia and hosts New Zealand, who have won five out of the last six World Cups.

RUGBY LEAGUE

Fans of rugby league are also set for a big year, with the World Cup (**23 October – 27 November**) heading to England in the autumn.

For the first time ever, the men's, women's and wheelchair competitions will all run alongside each other, with an epic weekend of finals to look forward to.

In the men's tournament, England will fancy their chances against Samoa, France and debutants Greece, while Scotland face a tricky task against Fiji, Italy and defending champions Australia. The women's competition sees England's Lionesses do battle with Papua New Guinea, Canada and Brazil – the first ever South American team to qualify for the World Cup.



GOLF

The golfing calendar will be returning to some normality after a year of disruption. America's Dustin Johnson will be chasing a second consecutive green jacket at The Masters (**5-11 April**), while the PGA Championship (**20-23 May**) – won last year by 23-year-old Collin Morikawa – is to be held at the exotic Kiawah Island resort in South Carolina.

The US Open (**17-20 June**) and the British Open (**15-18 July**) follow, but the main men's event is set to be the Ryder Cup (**24-26 September**) – a team competition between Europe and the United States held every two years, which was postponed in 2020. Team Europe, who won the last event in 2018, will head to Whistling Straits in Wisconsin as underdogs against a strong American team likely to feature Johnson, Morikawa and US Open champion Bryson DeChambeau (left).



The Solheim Cup (**31 August – 6 September**) – the women's equivalent to the Ryder Cup – also takes place this year, with Scotland's Catriona Matthew captaining Europe for the second time.

TENNIS

All eyes will be on Wimbledon (**28 June – 11 July**) this summer, after the 2020 Championships were cancelled. Andy Murray will be hoping to return to the singles competition following a career-threatening hip operation in 2018, while 16-year-old Cori 'Coco' Gauff (below) – who shocked the world by beating fellow American Venus Williams in the opening round in 2019 – is a potential world-beater.

Elsewhere, 20-time Grand Slam champion Roger Federer faces a race to be fit to play at the Australian Open (**8-21 February**), while Rafael Nadal and Iga Świątek hope to defend their titles at the French Open (**23 May – 6 June**). The US Open follows from **30 August – 12 September**.



FUN AND GAMES!

AFTER 2020 saw some of the world's biggest sporting events cancelled or postponed due to the coronavirus pandemic, 2021 is set to be absolutely packed with amazing sports action (fingers crossed!). Here's our guide to the unmissable year ahead!



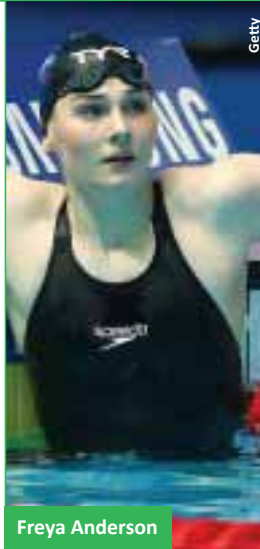
TOKYO OLYMPICS 23 July – 8 August

In March, athletes and sports fans around the world were devastated when it was announced that the 2020 Games in Japan were postponed until 2021.

However, organisers are hopeful that the event will be able to take place in July this year, with more than 11,000 athletes set to take part in more than 30 sports at 42 different venues all over the country.

Four sports – surfing, skateboarding, karate and sport climbing – will be making their Olympic debut in Tokyo, while baseball and softball will be returning, too, after not featuring at the Games since 2008.

Team GB have several medal hopes in the athletics, with sprinter Dina Asher-Smith going for gold in the 200m and heptathlete Katarina Johnson-Thompson looking to add to her 2019 World Championship win. In the pool, Adam Peaty will be hoping to match his success at Rio 2016, where he set a new world record as he won 200m breaststroke gold. 19-year-old Freya Anderson could also make a big splash at her first Olympics.

TOKYO PARALYMPICS 24 August – 5 September

Just two weeks after the Olympics, a fortnight of Paralympic sport will get underway in Tokyo.

More than 4,000 Paralympians will compete across 22 sports. There are different categories for athletes' various disabilities – they may be paralysed, missing limbs or have conditions that limit their movement or vision, and events are modified to account for this.

Among Team GB's many stars to look out for is Claire Cashmore, who will be competing at her fifth Paralympics, having

switched from swimming to para-triathlon after Rio 2016.

Double world champion Amy Truesdale will be hungry for success as her sport, para-taekwondo, makes its Paralympic debut.

FOOTBALL

The highlight of the footballing calendar in 2021 is the European Championship (11 June – 11 July), which was postponed from 2020 due to the pandemic.

The tournament, which takes place every four years, will be held in 12 cities across 12 European countries, with the semi-finals and final being hosted at Wembley Stadium in London.

England and Wales both qualified from their groups, while Scotland booked their place with a dramatic play-off victory against Serbia in November (below). The Scots, who haven't played in a major tournament since 1998, join England, Croatia and the Czech Republic in Group D, while Wales face Turkey, Italy and Switzerland in Group A.

The tournament's 'Group of Death', Group F, sees defending champions Portugal take on Hungary, Germany and World Cup winners France. Portuguese captain Cristiano Ronaldo is expected to make his final international tournament appearance at the Euros, when he'll be 36 years old.

Club football, meanwhile, is set to be as hectic as ever, with Lyon hoping to add to their incredible record of five Women's Champions League trophies in a row, and Jürgen Klopp's Liverpool looking to defend their Premier League title.
